
delivery of furniture and other resources. Although this is only our temporary site, our builders, staff and pupils have done an incredible job in

As we enter the New Year, we will look to involve our boys in the development of the building and I hope a 'Time Capsule' will be installed that will mark that they were the first students of Eden Boys' School, Preston.



Charity Events have been a notable success and it has been humbling to witness how committed our boys are to giving up their time and effort to raise money for a range of worthy causes and for those less fortunate than themselves. The MacMillan Coffee money saw a whole array of cakes and biscuits eaten by all and we were all impressed by how diligently our boys listened when two representatives from MacMillan Cancer care came to speak to them in assembly about the work that MacMillan does in the local area.

Similarly, the Children in Need Day saw boys wearing coloured Jubbahs, completing kick ups in the yard and completing a sponsored silence particular note must go to Mohammed Ilyas Patel 8M and Talha Umar 7N who individually raised £54.40 and £41.60 respectively. I must take this opportunity to thank each of you for the continuing support you have given our boys in this aspect of their school life and we will continue our charitable focus in the months to come. As in all things, the ethos of this school develops very much through our young people engaging in activities which help others. We are very fortunate to have so many considerate and compassionate members of our school community who demonstrate on a daily basis that thinking about the world we live in and doing something to help remains an important aspect of our character. This was further highlighted this week with our boys keen to support residents in Cumbria devastated by the recent floods.



I am delighted to report that PE lessons are progressing well at UCLAN on a Monday and Tuesday afternoon. Our boys tell me how much they enjoy using the specialist facilities on site and there is not a week that passes where somebody doesn't ask me to come and take part with them. This all bodes well for the facilities that will be available to them in September 2016. It is also impressive to see how many of our boys attend the Sunday Sports Academy and are keen to participate in an inter-Tauheedul Schools' football event which will take place on Monday 21st December. I have no doubt that when they play, they will do us proud.



Remembrance Day and Anti Bullying Day provided us as a school with time to stop, think and remember. Mrs Buxton helped us to create some spectacular displays in school to help mark these days and we were further supported by Lancashire Constabulary who helped provide a real insight into issues such as online safety and stereotyping.



As you will read in this newsletter, our boys have enjoyed the different visits that have taken place during the course of this term, notably an attempt to break a World Record for the 'World's Longest Human Circuit', 'A visit to Old Trafford in Manchester to watch Manchester United play Ipswich Town in the Capital One Cup' and another to 'Rock and River' where I was encouraged alongside many

other staff to participate in the various activities including rock climbing and the balance beam. It is therefore fitting in response to a suggestion from our Student Shuraa that we end the term with a visit to the Ice Rink in Blackburn.



Eden Boys' Preston was visited on 25th November by Mr George Lloyd who is a DfE advisor. We were joined on the day by Mufti Hamid Patel Chief Executive of the Trust. The purpose of Mr Lloyd's visit was to look at the how effectively the school was progressing since its opening in September across a number of areas including teaching and learning and pupil outcomes. We are delighted to report that the visit was a big success across all areas. Mr Lloyd was particularly impressed with the boys themselves who greeted him warmly on his arrival. They told him both in and out of lessons how much they enjoyed being at the school, valued the extra-curricular events and were eloquently able to describe contemporary issues. We will continue to keep you updated with any further visits which take place at the school.

Digital Arts Project

Our boys have been learning all about animation in their Digital Arts lessons and the challenge for the term was to have a go at making some of their own. We started by identifying all the different ways that animation could be created and learnt about the different styles. We then focused on stop-motion and set about learning how to make characters out of paper; a style called Cubeecraft. The boys printed out some designs made by other designers and learned about the construction of the figures; it was fiddly but the reward of seeing the finished product made it more than worth it. Before we could design our own characters we first had to learn about narrative structure and the students learned used a template used by Disney called the Hero's Journey. Having planned their narratives the boys had to prepare a character study for either the hero, villain, mentor or ally before they could get to the planning and construction of their characters.




Outdoor Pursuits Day

GCSEs are Changing Nationally

Our curriculum, assessment structure and teaching pedagogy ensures that we set every learner up for success.

GCSEs will have changed by the time your son completes his exams. New GCSE content will be taught from Sept 2015 for English Language, English Literature and Maths. Geography, History, Religious Studies, Citizenship, French, Science and Computer Science will commence in Sep 2016 with Arabic, PE and Art changing in Sept 2017.

GCSEs will be more difficult in content, tests and pass marks. The way GCSEs will be graded will also change. The table shows 'current and new GCSE' grading.

Our assessment strategy will ensure teachers, pupils and parents are fully prepared for these changes. We will be holding Pupil and Parent Curriculum and Assessment Meetings to explain the changes and how they will benefit our learners.

We are Going Cashless

We are in the process of setting up ParentPay enabling parents to make payments online for meals, transport and trips. We will be writing to all parents over the next few weeks with full details.

Dangers of E-cigs and Shisha Pens

The school has been informed by the local police of the rise in young children using e-cigarettes and shisha pens. These items are completely banned from school and any child found carrying or using such device will be dealt with according to the school's policy on bringing banned items into school. From a parenting perspective, it is vital that parents check bags and pockets of their sons on a regular basis to ensure they are not carrying harmful items. Such items are dangerous and can cause children to develop harmful habits which can lead to long term health issues. The school asks that parents remain vigilant and reports to school any shop they suspect of selling these products to young children. The school will inform the police immediately.

Ice-skating Trip

As a progressive school, we, at Eden Boys, believe that widening experiences for our boys is vital for them to get a good all round education. As part of its Physical Education "Give it a go" initiative, Eden Boys recently took all of its pupils ice skating to enhance the PE curriculum. Many boys had never been ice skating before and to see them develop confidence on the ice was great to see.





The ice skating session was also a chance for pupils to unwind after a long and difficult autumn term and to participate in something more social whilst learning a new skill - especially having completed their half termly assessments.

Mr Matadar commented, "experiences such as these are vital to refresh and reenergise the boys for learning. The ice skating sessions were aimed at finishing the term on a very positive note in readiness for the spring term in January."

Computing Club

On Mondays, our Year 7 students are starting to learn brand new skills whilst using some familiar ones also. Titled 'Programming with Minecraft', our club aims to get students learning coding skills by using the Python programming language to interact with the popular game Minecraft. So far the students have been busy setting up our brand new Raspberry Pi mini computers and connecting them to our existing equipment in the computing classroom. The Raspberry Pi's come shipped like in the picture to the left and the students have had to fit them into cases, install the operating system and correctly connect the relevant input and output devices. We have also learned how to set up separate logins for students so that they can save their progress week to week. The students have learned a lot about the Raspberry Pi devices and have enjoyed using Minecraft. After the Christmas break we will be getting into learning to code which will give the students a great headstart for preparing for coding for their GCSE exam in Computer Science. UKMT Team Challenge

I am very pleased and excited to be able to write about our impending trip to the regional finals of the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust Team Challenge. The UKMT Team Challenge is organised and run by the School of Mathematics at the University of Leeds, and Regional Finals run at over 65 centres across the United Kingdom from February to April.

A team of four Year 8 students will be selected to compete against teams from other schools from our area at the Regional final, to be held at Lancaster Royal Grammar School, on Wednesday April 27, 2016.

After some coaching and practice, our team will be confident and prepared to take on the rest at a variety of tasks. They will need to be able to work independently and as part of the team to solve problems and puzzles which will require all their skills of logic and deduction. Whether against other teams or against the clock, each round will be challenging and lively. There are four very competitive rounds to complete; the Group Round, Crossnumber, Shuttle Round and Relay.

An example of a question from last year's group round is;

"Andrew drove one and a half miles to work and then walked back home at a tenth of his average driving speed. The two journeys lasted a total of 33 minutes. What was Andrew's average walking speed in mph?"

I am very much looking forward to working with the brightest minds at Eden Boys' School. If there are any interested year 8 students who can solve the problem above and would like to be considered for the team, please speak to Mrs Buxton as soon as possible.

The winning team at each Regional Final and a few runners-up will receive an invitation to the National Final to be held at the Royal Horticultural Halls, London in June next year. Watch this space!!



Eden Sports Academy

This term saw Eden Boys' School launch its weekend Sports Academy. Based in the heart of the local community, the Academy's aim is to enrich the experiences the pupils receive as part of their school life. The Academy is run in partnership with Red Rose Sports Club who are a pioneering community sports hub that has been operating in Preston for nearly 20 years. With large numbers of pupils attending each Sunday morning it is pleasing to see that the pupils value the opportunities that are provided for them by the school. Mr Matadar, Assistant Principal at Eden Boys' School commented, "it is so pleasing to see boys give up a lie in on a Sunday morning to come and participate in competitive sporting activities. This attitude is so important if we are going to foster positive attitudes to lifelong participation in sport."

The school believes firmly in the power of sport to develop disciplined routines and it is this that excites the Principal, Miss Middlemass. She commented, "no matter what sport our boys want to excel at, we are here to nurture and guide them to be successful. We fully believe that our boys should not only work hard at Eden but also play hard."



If your son has not yet attended the Academy programme they run each Sunday morning at 10am – 11am.

Assessment

Pupils have undertaken their baseline and first half assessments across all subjects.

You will have received the first of five report cards that you will receive during this school year.

This report card tells you:

- The latest figures for your son's attendance and punctuality to school.
- Your son's End of Year Target Level in each subject.
- Your son's End of Year Forecast Level in each subject- this is the level your son's teacher feels he is going to achieve at the end of the year (based upon his current progress).
- Whether your son is working above, on or below his end of year target in each subject.


I am sure that you will have taken the time to look through the report card and set targets for improvement with your son.

Learners have also received their Curriculum Guidance Booklets. As shared at the Curriculum Meeting in October, the Curriculum Guidance booklet shows the <u>learning</u> journey your son will undertake in each of his In the progress review subjects. section, your son will record his data targets for each subject. Following each assessment your son will record his test result and forecast here as well as what he did well in the assessment and what he needs to improve. Please take time to discuss performance in each subject following each assessment.

Our Intervention Programme commenced in November. Initially the focus has been on pupils who have come to us below nationally expected levels (level 4c or below) in English and maths. The programme is tailored to suit individual needs providing personalised learning with the English and maths teams. We thank the English and maths teams for giving up their time to provide this additional support and the learners for engaging so positively with it.

New Building Progress

Work on our new building on London Road is well underway. The asbestos has been removed and parts of the complex are being demolished for a brand new sports facility. Partition walls have been inserted in the Main School Building. The site will have indoor and outdoor sports facilities. The work is on schedule and estimated to finish in July 2016. We are planning to move to the site in August ready for September 2016.







Science Club

Currently in the science club pupils are facing a challenge – to build a self-propelled vehicle u s i n g c o m m o n household materials such as rubber bands, CDs, string, lolly sticks, sellotape etc.

What's the point of school uniform?

The Eden School promotes excellence and aspiration in everything its pupils do. The school uniform is designed to reinforce this spirit of excellence. It is smart and practical, encourages pupils to take pride in being part of their school and

enables them to act as ambassadors for the Tauheedul educational experience. The uniform is also designed to portray a professional and business-like image.

High standards of presentation are required at all times when wearing the school uniform, with clean clothes, tidy hair and no jewellery (except where agreed on grounds of faith). Whenever the school uniform is worn, it must be complete and not mixed with non-uniform clothing. This includes when travelling to and from school.

School uniforms are made compulsory for all students since it helps lessen social conflicts within the school because not all students can keep up with the latest trends in fashion.

When there is no debate on what a student is allowed wear to school, then that makes mornings easier for parents and for children. Everyone knows exactly what the child needs to wear, their regulated school uniform.

School uniform is important in creating an effective learning atmosphere where students focus on their learning not their clothing.

Key equipment includes a pen (with black ink), a pencil (HB), pencil sharpener, rubber, ruler, protractor and a compass. All boys should also have a dictionary with thesaurus and a calculator. Calculators can be purchased from school at a cost of around £7.00


Anti-bullying Week

Attendance!



Going to school every day is the single most important part of a child's education. Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind. We all want our children to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with children coming to school each and every day.

Children develop good habits by going to school every day – habits that are necessary to succeed after school, whether in the workplace or in further study. Having a good education is an important factor in opening up more opportunities in adult life.

Missing school can have a big impact on children academically and socially. It can affect their exam results, as well as it can affect their relationships with other students, and lead to social isolation.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a child misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes.

Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.

A typical scenario

Many pupils have an attendance rate of around 90%. Most parents and students think that this is very good. However, if a student has a 90% attendance record, it means that he is absent from lessons for the equivalent of <u>one half-day every week</u>. A 90% attendance rate means that the student has missed the equivalent of <u>four whole weeks</u> of lessons in the school year. If his attendance rate is at 90% throughout KS3 and KS4 (5 years) he has missed the equivalent of about <u>one half of a school year</u>.

Did you know?

- A child who is absent one day per week from school misses an equivalent of two years of their school life.
- 90% of students with absence rates below 85% fail to achieve five or more good grades of GCSE and around one third achieve no GCSEs at all.
- Poor examination results limit young people's options and poor attendance suggests to colleges and employers that these students are unreliable.
