

What an exciting year we have had here at Eden Boys' School in 2017-18! At the start of the year we welcomed our 'new' Year 7 boys to the school. They arrived on a wet rainy day in September looking exceptionally smart, but nervous and excited at the same time. What a delight they have been this year and we have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know them all. Years 8-10 settled well into their new roles at the school and have continued to show us how responsible and caring they are.

The new academic year brought new staff to the school, and with them came a whole range of new ideas and contributions to the departments they joined. I have thoroughly enjoyed the process of recruiting staff during January through until May who will join our existing departments in September 2018. We were incredibly pleased to be able to secure three of our newly appointed staff earlier than September and they have all made a really positive start in the school.

Over the summer, our Estates team will be working incredibly hard to develop the school building and site. New rooms will come in to operation and there will be a significant amount of redecoration. We also have an incredibly exciting project on the horizon that I have been working on closely with a company called 'Eric Wright'. Geography

After completing their end of year exams, the boys are now enjoying being able to research their favourite geography topic in more detail as part of a team project, which they will be presenting to their peers in July. Examples from pupils include Ecosystems of the River Nile, The African rift valley and Madagascar's tropical rainforest.

Year 8 are currently demonstrating their team work through a paired project on their final topic around Brazil, this has allowed them to link their past knowledge from topics such as ecosystems and tropical rainforests to a case study area. The pupils are creating a variety of methods such as models and displays to present their research to their peers later in July. Examples from pupils include football as a way to escape poverty, impacts of tourism during the world cup in 2014 and how humans are affecting the tropical rainforest.



"In my opinion I think that Drama is a very fun subject and we get to learn new skills and techniques." Yahyaa Chhadat, 7I



Both performances will enhance subject knowledge of each GCSE text, but – most importantly – will give our boys the unique opportunity to watch these plays live and in doing so will give them a long-lasting memory that is sure to stay with them forever.



World Refugee Day

The 20th June was an important day as it marks World Refugee Day. For their assembly Form group 8E presented many facts and their own opinions on this important day. They informed both years seven and eight of the plight of many refugees around the world and encouraged their peers to imagine how it would feel if they themselves had to flee their homes and everything familiar and valued by them at a moment's notice. Form 8E presented many facts, some of which, are detailed below;

- 1. Refugee week was first held in 1998 in response to the negative views of refugees and asylum seekers held by the general public
- 2. The aim of refugee week is to promote a better understanding of why people seek asylum and to foster understanding between communities.
- 3. Refugee week takes place annually across the world in the week containing Refugee day which is on the 20th June.
- 4. On the 4th December 2000, the United Nations decided that, from 2001, 20th June would be World Refugee Day.
- 5. A refugee is a person who has been forced to leave their country for some reason.
- 6. Most refugees leave their homes and countries in order to escape war, persecution or natural disaster.
- 7. In Syria, millions of people have left to escape the violence, conflict and persecution due to the civil war taking place there.
- 8. This has caused one of the worst humanitarian crises of our time. More than half of the county's population are in need of urgent humanitarian aid- food, water, shelter and protection.
- 9. There are thousands of unaccompanied children, whose parents and families have been killed.
- 10. A person who has left their country as a political refugee to seek protection and resettlement in another country is called asylum seeker.

Form 8E then posed three questions to their audience for contemplation; in what ways can we share futures with asylum seekers and refugees? What 3 things would you miss the most if you had to leave the place and country you live in because of war? What 5 things would you take with you if you had to leave your home suddenly like a refugee? Remember that you have to be able to carry them.

On reflection the boys in our form group realised that they would miss their home comforts. These included; sofa, bed, T.V., food, kitchen, restaurants, car and their house.

They also expressed the opinions that they would want to take their mum and dad, their PS4, phone and router...but were encouraged to reflect upon the availability to charge and use these items without a power point to do so. We would lose many things that we now take for granted.

Another pupil said they would take a survival kit...very wise, but would there be time to gather one together?




History

Y7







Science

Making Waves

The Year 10 pupils at Eden Boys' school have been investigating water waves as part of the wave's topic in Physics. The ripple tank was set up in the science laboratory. This new apparatus allowed the students to investigate the wavelength, frequency and wave speed of the water waves produced in the tank. Pupils had the opportunity to take measurements of the frequency and wavelength and use them to calculate the wave speed using the following equations:

Wave speed = Frequency & Wavelength

&

Speed = Distance / Time



The learning experience within the new science GCSE curriculum is now greatly enhanced through the introduction of the compulsory core practicals which must be completed by all pupils in all 3 sciences: Biology, Chemistry and Physics. Pupils will continue their scientific enquiry, investigative and mathematical skills in September when they investigate Density, Specific Heat capacity and Radiation.

Pupils in Year 7 have been writing articles on how they find science at Eden. These articles have been a pleasure to read! Whilst uncovering various scientific concepts to experimenting with acids and alkalis, pupils in Year 7 have been wholly fascinated and captivated by science.

When asked about positive and negative features of science lessons, all pupils unanimously agreed that science is one of their favourite subjects to study at school and completing more practical work would make science lessons even better. Consequently, to further enthral our pupils of the countless wonders of science and simultaneously facilitate them to flourish academically in science, more scientific investigations will be conducted whilst delving deeper into the study of science.

Science Day

Pupils in Year 9 visited Preston's College on Monday 2nd July 2018 to partake in the Lancashire Science and Technology Day. This was to extend the work that pupils are undertaking as part of their science studies.

Bringing science to life, partaking in scientific discussions and becoming contenders in science quizzes with pupils from neighbouring secondary schools were some of the activities that our pupils completed.


Our pupils worked alongside pupils from other schools to complete a 'Diagnostics Test' where they diagnosed ill patients with the help of junior doctors. Pupils used stethoscopes and blood pressure monitors and even tested urine samples! This was exceptionally fascinating and inspired many of our pupils to study medicine in the future.

Furthermore, during the 'E-Fit Challenge', pupils used a special software (used by 95% of the police force!) to describe and uncover the identity of criminals in various scenarios. This brought science to life which was enjoyed greatly by our pupils.

Also, our pupils became engineers during the 'Robot Challenge' where they coded for a robot to follow instructions and complete an obstacles course. Hamzah Nakhuda and Hozaifa Nawaz performed extremely well in this challenge and won the round! Well done!

The guest of honour at the event was Lord Shuttleworth, the Lord Lieutenant of Lancashire, representative of the Queen. He passionately talked to the pupils about skills and craftsmanship and highlighted the importance of hard work and educational excellence. He also awarded pupils with trophies and certificates which made this a memorable day.

So, we hope and pray that our pupils had an enjoyable day where they showcased the depth of their scientific knowledge and were inspired by the team to pursue further studies and careers related to science and technology.



Science





GCSE Chemistry

Year 10 are now well underway with their GCSE Chemistry course. Most recently, they have been studying the topic of quantitative chemistry. Pupils have been learning about 'moles', and how to complete calculations involving molar quantities. They have explored how to calculate the empirical formula of a compound in theory and practical investigation and calculated how to make up a known amount of solution of a given concentration Can you solve the following GCSE problem?

"Imagine you are a lab technician. You are asked for 250cm3 of a 1 mol dm-3 solution of sodium nitrate (NaNO3) for a chemistry lesson. How would you make up the solution"

Quantitative chemistry is an essential part of industry. Scientists use quantitative analysis in a whole range of areas including the production of the food we eat, in all aspects of medicine and veterinary science to the oil and gas industry. For pupils wanting to follow a career in science, carrying out chemical calculations is a vital skill to learn.


The holidays are also a good opportunity to have positive conversations about the internet, so if something ever does upset your child online they would feel more confident in confiding in you.
